

#### Preparing the Ingredients Before an Environmental Portrait (Room T/U)

Presenter: Dr. Andrea Hudson, Department of Journalism, UGA Grady College

"Mise en place" is a French culinary phrase. It describes the practice of preparing ingredients and organizing a kitchen to ensure chefs are not distracted when it's time to cook. The same idea can be applied to environmental portraiture. You can take steps that will allow you to focus on the moment instead of the "ingredients." Here, we will discuss how to prepare for your next environmental portrait assignment.

#### Going Below the Surface: How to Write In-depth Stories (V/W)

"Through Our Lens": Responsible Reporting on Race, Diversity, and Social Justice Issues in Media (Room Y/Z)

Curiosity and getting "bit" by the journalism bug starts early with young creatives who want to save the world with their love for telling the stories of others. What happens when the stories are tough to tell... and can be controversial i.e. race and gender? This session takes a look into what equitable, ethical journalism looks like in the lens of a media maker who is consciously thinking about the evolving diverse world around them. From social movements to social media, we will chat about stories that matter, uplifting voices traditionally shutout, and learn more about strengthening skillsets related to covering social justice in society.

#### Resisting Retaliation: Legal Challenges to Student Press Censorship (Room Y/Z)

This presentation will focus on the ways that the United States Supreme Court's decision in Hazelwood v. Kuhlmeier (1988) left student journalists in collegiate media programs susceptible to prior review, censorship, and retaliation. We will examine the laws and litigation strategies used to ensure student press freedoms.

#### Writing Ledes That Succeed (Room F/G)

Presenter: Tom White, Broadcast Engineer, UGA Grady College

Learn the various lede types used in a newscast in order to build your tool set to better engage your viewers and get your message heard. This hands-on workshop will give you an opportunity to write a lede as well as work on your camera presence. If you are producing video in any way, this is the session for you!

# **Keynote Speaker**



Sydney Shadrix is an anchor and reporter at WYFF News 4 in Greenville, South Carolina. Prior to her current role, she spent three years as an anchor and producer at KLTV 7 in Tyler, Texas.

While at KLTV 7, Shadrix covered the Texas power outage in February 2021 that left millions of people without electricity for days. Additionally, she tracked the Covid-19 pandemic in East Texas and wrote about how the virus affected classrooms and schools all over the state.

Before becoming a journalist, Shadrix received a Bachelor of Music in Music Education from Belmont University in Nashville, Tennessee, where she graduated magna cum laude. Shadrix is a licensed Music and English teacher and the latter drove her to pursue journalism. She spent three years instructing music to middle and high school students in Nashville, where she also directed musicals, oversaw six choirs, and taught music history. Because of her previous educational experience, Shadrix is familiar with the value of learning and what goes on in the classroom by listening to the stories of the teachers and students, which she took into her journalistic career.

In 2017, Shadrix pursued a Master of Arts in Mass Communication and Journalism at the University of Georgia's Grady College of Journalism. She served as GSPA's graduate assistant and also as a graduate assistant for the travel writing study abroad program in Munich, Germany. She spent two summers guiding students as they explored the relationship between journalism, Western European history and culture.

### **Presenters**

Jennifer Grove Camacho is a proud Polk County-raised, Atlanta resident. The former Manager of Community Affairs for WSB-TV spent a decade working at small-, medium-, and large-market television stations. Jennifer is an Atlanta Business Chronicle 40 under 40 awardee and LEAD Atlanta graduate. To date, she has recorded, written, and edited 1,500+ community-focused stories. Jennifer now leans on her previous experience as a TV news reporter, multi-platform producer and community affairs manager to help organizations create content that connects with their audiences. In 2020, Jennifer launched PLOT My Story, a media creation & PR consulting company that helps put stories "on the map".

**Kelly Caudle** is Vice President for Strategy and Programs at Georgia Humanities, a statewide organization that encourages the understanding of diverse viewpoints and stories through supporting and conducting public

programs. A recent program is "Democracy and the Informed Citizen," a collaboration with UGA's Grady College of Journalism and the Atlanta Press Club, which produced a media literacy guide, "How Journalists and the Public Shape Our Democracy: From Social Media and 'Fake News' to Reporting Just the Facts." Previously, she served as the project director of the online New Georgia Encyclopedia, following roles in magazine and book publishing.

Maya Clement is a junior at Clarke Central High School in Athens, Georgia, and the Managing Editor for the ODYSSEY Media Group. Clement has attended SIPA, GSPA and NSPA conferences. She also has presented at GSPA and SIPA events.

Janieria Dupree received her B.S. in Psychology from the University of West Georgia & her M.Ed. in Higher Education Administration from Georgia Southern University. Janieria has been in higher education for almost six years, most recently at Kennesaw State University, and she brings her experience from Advising, the Registrar's Office, and Admissions to the UGA Career Center.

Lindsey Floyd is a lawyer and legal fellow with the University of Georgia's First Amendment Clinic. She uses community education, prelitigation strategy, and impact litigation to advance the First Amendment rights of citizens and journalists. She graduated from the University of Colorado School of Law in May 2021 and Arizona State University in May 2018 with a degree in Political Science and minors in Social Welfare and Criminal Justice.

Molly Harwell is a junior at Clarke Central High School in Athens, Georgia, and the Editor-in-Chief for the ODYSSEY Media Group. She hopes to learn about leadership and create strong connections with her peers. Molly also wants to create quality pieces that spark the interest of others within the Clarke Central community.

**Dr. Andrea Hudson** is a lecturer who teaches a variety of journalism classes, including photojournalism and reporting and writing across platforms at Grady College. Her research is grounded in women's studies and visual communication. She has spent more than a decade working as a reporter, photojournalist, and public relations practitioner, specializing in the areas of government and

politics. Hudson also owns and operates a freelance photography business where she provides environmental portraits and documentary photography for clients.

**Miles Lawrence** is a sophomore at Clarke Central High School in Athens, Georgia, and a Variety Staffer for the ODYSSEY Media Group. Lawrence has attended multiple journalistic events during his two years on staff, including GSPA and SIPA conferences.

Lough studies visual communication and solutions journalism, with an emphasis on photojournalism. He teaches graduate-level visual communication method and theory, as well as undergraduate photography and journalism ethics and diversity courses.

Prior to serving Grady College as an advisor, she worked in residence life at SCAD and the University of Mississippi. Stephanie Moreno is the director of the Georgia Scholastic Press Association. 

Previously, Walker worked in several behind-the-scenes roles in television news markets including Augusta, GA; New York, NY; Houston, TX; Las Vegas, NV; Columbia, SC—covering some of the nation's biggest stories.

**Tom White** is the broadcast engineer for the Grady College of Journalism and Mass Communication. Previously, Tom led two high school video production programs to national recognition focusing on news and live event production. Prior to education, Tom was marketing and online content director for iHeart Radio in Atlanta and Greensboro, NC.
