### DAMAR HAMLIN

The Buffalo Bills safety player went into cardiac arrest during a Monday night football game... where the world watched the medical emergency unfold

On Jan. 7, ABC 10 news reported that within a few days, Hamlin began to make exponential progress in his recovery, and that “days after his cardiac arrest, Buffalo Bills safety Damar Hamlin said he was thankful for the love he’s received and asked for continued prayers.” “He wrote in his first post since his collapse, ‘The love has been overwhelming, but I’m thankful for every single person that prayed for me and reached out. If you know me you know I’m only going to make me stronger,’ he added. ‘On a long road keep praying for me!’”

Two days later, the athlete was reportedly discharged from the hospital.

NBC’s “Hamlin tweeted his own message on Monday afternoon: ‘Grateful for the awesome care I received at UCMC. Happy to be back in Buffalo. The docs and nurses at Buffalo General have already made me feel at home!’”

Damar Hamlin is recovering back in Buffalo, where he continues to recover.


JUST THE FACTS: 54% of American children play sports - that's 60 million student-athletes

3.5 million children ages 14 and younger are injured annually by sports-related activities

21% of all traumatic brain injuries among American children are caused by sports and recreational activities

215,000 children under 14 treated in hospital with concussion-like symptoms and require a doctor's clearance and start return to play protocol every year - 10% of those are high school athletes

7 million athletes from August to February have pressure, tension, dizziness, blurry vision and motion sickness - 10% of those are high school athletes
