National High School Journalism Convention

April 14-17, 2016

This semi-annual gathering of high school students & advisors is co-sponsored by the Journalism **Education Association and** the National Scholastic Press Association. The convention will be held in sunny downtown Los Angeles, California from Thursday, April 14 until Sunday, April 17 at the Westin Bonaventura Hotel. Participants will be able to choose from a variety of practical and professional learning sessions, from high-profile keynotes to specific, problem-solving breakouts and hands-on workshops.

The earlybird registration deadline is March 22 and the fee is \$90 for JEA or NSPA members. After March 22 the registration fee is \$100 for members. 

Reflections: Georgia Journalism Academy

ost of my high school summers were spent shuffling from one camp to another, in order to pad up my resume/CV as much as possible before the dreaded college applications. But Georgia Journalism Academy was different. The campers

were some of the coolest human beings I have ever had the pleasure of meeting. The counselors were super sweet, passionate, and so enthusiastic that daily meetings did not even feel like meetings. And I could not have asked for better mentors than the camp directors at the time and my broadcast journalism track teacher. Advisers: You are not alone!

dvising high school student media can feel like an isolated gig, especially since many of us don't benefit from "job-alike" colleagues in our schools with whom we can collaborate. The political, ethical, pedagogical, organizational and even technological challenges can overwhelm at times, and some of us feel the extra weight of an "impostor"

complex" because we don't have backgrounds in journalism, broadcast or design.

We value a free press, creative student expression, the lessons learned through collaboration, the benefits of feedback and

revision, and the memories created through the shared experiences on staff, right? But it can still be a lonely road to trod, one filled with deadline worries, financial obstacles, administrative resistance, undermotivated students, and "never enough time" frustrations.

Here's the thing: you are not alone. Geographically distant from others who share your passion and values? For sure. But not alone.

As a GSPA member and (ideally) a Journalism Education Association member, we are included on active ListServ conversations that reveal how others are struggling, aspiring, and innovating. These threads regularly introduce me to valuable resources and push me to reflect on my instruction, grading, staff organization, even ethical stances. Veteran advisers share generously with newbies, and creative upstarts offer exciting glimpses into work their students are producing. It's virtual community, and the asynchronous exchanges can take a little getting used to. The benefit of breaking the isolation is worth it, though. Go ahead: post a question, offer an insight, or provide some reassurance to others. Add your voice.

Ethical and legal issues run through our work, and our isolation can prevent us from shepherding our students through controversial issues. These are impressionable young people, and we can serve as courageous models of democracy in action if we remember that we're not alone. The Student Press Law Center (splc.org) devotes itself to protecting First Amendment rights by providing free legal assistance for the over 2500 callers that contact them each year. Investigate their resources, educate yourself, and then position yourself to advocate for your students so they can become the next generation of First Amendment defenders.

As tools for reporting, producing, and promoting stories evolve, we can find ourselves overwhelmed by learning curves. Many of us still cling to the notion that we must command a certain mastery before we try to teach our students. We see the work of successful programs awarded GSPA, SIPA and NSPA honors and think to ourselves: we're just not that kind of program – a sinister, self-imposed isolation. The Poynter Institute's NewsU (newsu.org) offers dozens of no- or low-cost

courses for advisers and students, many taught by some of the most prominent names in media scholarship.

JEA's Digital Media site (jeadigitalmedia.org) organizes dozens of tech-

specific how-tos in dozens of categories, posts written by advisers for advisers. And JEA's curriculum modules (curriculum.jea.org) provide in-depth daily plans for week-long and multi-week units. The handouts and slideshows are downloadable and editable, allowing advisers to customize the content based on their students' needs. Don't let what you don't know leave you feeling alone.

Conferences and conventions provide special opportunities to physically come together, to ask questions of session presenters, to see new approaches firsthand, to be inspired and energized. GSPA's fall conference has grown in its diverse offerings and attendance, and it provides the most economical means to break the isolation. Some Georgia advisers have found a meaningful community in the Southern Interscholastic Press Association, whose March conventions in South Carolina draw hundreds from around the southeast and include presentations from nationally-known advisers and professionals. JEA teams with NSPA to present two conventions a year, and the variety of sessions, contests, and exhibitors is unrivaled. New York City attracts devoted staffs yearly to the Columbia Scholastic Press Association convention, and broadcast advisers find their niche in the Student Television Network's spring convention as well as summer workshops offered by the Academy of Scholastic Broadcasting.

Tens of thousands of students rely on advisers like us to facilitate an engaging and rewarding experience for them. They can't understand how alone we sometimes feel in our work as their advisers. To give them what they deserve and to cultivate our own sense of job satisfaction, though, we need to inventory what's available to us, make good use of these resources, and claim our place at the table with other Georgia advisers and those who share our passion across the country. It's good to remember that we are not alone.

Your Organization... Your Voice


